


Mark Daniels is a versatile tenor who hails from Kennebunk, Maine. Mr. Daniels studied at the Eastman School of Music in the studio of Rita Shane, where he made his Eastman Opera Theatre operatic debut as Sam in Carlisle Floyd's Susannah. He performed the role of Ferrando in Mozart's Cosi fan tutte in Urbania, Italy with Benton Hess's Oberlin in Italy program and again in Buffalo, NY with Buffalo Opera Unlimited.

In addition to his performing many other opera roles, Great Lakes Productions created a show around Mark Daniels called "A Tenor," which he performed for two years throughout upstate New York with "The Tuscan Trio and Two Sopranos." Recently he was featured as a tenor soloist in performances of Mozart's Requiem and Haydn's Lord Nelson's Mass as well as in a highly acclaimed Opera Under the Stars evening at Highland Park.

The larger part of **Rob Goodling**'s musical life has been coaching, accompanying and training singers. Having taught music history courses at the Hochstein School of Music and Dance for twenty years, Mr. Goodling was also the vocal music and choral director at Churchville-Chili High School for twenty-eight years, where many of his students went on to outstanding music careers. His choirs consistently won state and national honors that resulted in their representation of New York State in international performance tours to many nations. In addition to being awarded several Outstanding Music Educator citations; the Rochester Philharmonic Orchestra named him their 1996 Outstanding Choral Director; and he was the first recipient of the Roberts Wesleyan College Outstanding Music Educator award. Mr. Goodling was named an affiliate Professor of Music Education at the Eastman School of Music, where he later served as editor of the opera department's FEO Newsletter.

In 2017, Mark Daniels and collaborative pianist Rob Goodling began a partnership that has resulted in continuing recitals together in New York State, Florida, and Maine.





Rochester native **Amanda Varrone** received her Master of Music degree in Vocal Performance and Pedagogy from the Peabody Conservatory of the Johns Hopkins University, and has studied in Italy and Austria during summers of her undergraduate and graduate years. While a student at Churchville-Chili Senior High School, she studied with Rob Goodling and is pleased to be working with him once again. Amanda is a very busy mother of two daughters and a professional vocalist—singing throughout Rochester for various events, such as weddings, funerals and masses. She is thrilled to be performing with Mark and Rob again in the Opera Guild of Rochester's Holiday Bravo Nights recital. 

X: The Life and Times of Malcolm X

The Life and Times of Malcolm X by Anthony Davis and his cousin Thulani Davis premiered in 1986. In the operatic tradition, this would be considered a contemporary work. For many people it can be rather overwhelming to experience a new opera. The plot might be too political, too dense, or fail to take advantage of an entertaining, and palatable plot. Due to modern trends in composition it can be difficult, if not impossible to find a singable melody, or a tune to whistle home. The staging can be so unexpected that, as an audience member, you're not sure that the show onstage is the same as the one described in your Playbill. Generally the anxiety over these issues leads to complete avoidance of this musical adventure. Instead, let this article assist in calibrating the mind, ears, and eyes to this modern work.

What caused composer Anthony Davis to choose Malcolm X as the subject of his opera? Politically, Malcolm X was considered a charismatic, commanding, and controversial man. He was assassinated at the age of 39. Because of his thoughts and actions, he became a legend in the conversations about Civil Rights. Composer Anthony Davis thought Malcolm's life made him a tragic hero, lending the story well to the operatic stage. Although this show is based on the life of Malcolm X, Anthony and Thulani Davis hoped not only to "make the story of Malcolm X a living history for the younger generations who didn't experience and live during his time", but to cause the individual to reflect (May 3, 2022. Interview at Detroit Opera with Anthony and Thulani Davis, https://youtu.be/bDgbB_Z4mOY?si=b8rgkJEJ3100znvu). They wanted to encourage the audience to consider their individual ability to change and be dynamic forces in the world. So instead of looking for a big verismo climax, be prepared to experience the slow rolling undulations of the human struggle.

The music of *X:* The Life and Times of Malcolm *X* is modern in nature. A full orchestra with a plush cushion of strings is traded in for the timbre of an American chamber orchestra. From the downbeat of the overture, anyone familiar with Gershwin or American Big Band will have some tonal and stylistic reference for anchor.

Anthony Davis uses many techniques to deftly achieve shifts in the circumstances and the psyche of the characters. Three selections that stand out include the Social Worker, Child's Aria, and Act 2 Scene 1. The scene of the Social Worker is pure genius. Davis takes away any sense of tonal center and leans into fairly avant-garde, jagged improvisation to aurally represent the amount of chaos not only in the mind of Malcolm's mother Louise, but the tangible environment in the home and its children. After this scene is the Child's Aria. In stark contrast to the rhythmic improvisational breaks of the former number, Davis orchestrates a very expansive void by employing shifting, hollow long tones. In doing so he gives us a true sense of the inner feelings of young Malcolm: As if he has nothing to anchor to, that he's lost and confused. Later in the opera, whenever the group of the Nation of Islam is involved, they sing vaguely like a gospel choir. These voices are united in rhythm, and generally in harmony. There is a superficial connection to religion in this compositional application. It seems that a slightly deeper meaning is the appeal to unity in the midst of a story and life that has been composed of chaos and violence. It is true however that there aren't many tunes to hum while leaving the theater. As a whole, there are numerous brilliant moments achieved by Anthony Davis's composition and Thulani's text.

The staging and visual aspects of this production are the work of Robert O'Hara. He is mostly known for his work in Broadway and Musical Theater, but he was excited to be a part of this new work. What inspired him most was showing the transformation of Malcolm in his behaviors, thoughts and ideologies. In an interview with Leo Adam Biga and the American Theater publication, O'Hara said. "...You can see how one can evolve in various ways of understanding. That is what's so powerful about the message to me of the Malcolm X story: It's an evolution. His liberation evolved, so I think there is that lesson in that one can actually learn as one teaches." (Nov. 2, 2022) O'hara uses his knowledge of the score to create fairly abstract sets and staging to capture these quickly moving scenes. It seems that this helps create a time-less space and setting, thus assisting in creating a more contemplative environment and atmosphere for the audience.

The way that Anthony and Thulani Davis approached creating *X: The Life and Times of Malcolm X*, and Robert O'Hara's staging might be the best way to approach such a complex topic and person. They each allowed the story to be less about the controversial preachings of a gripping political figure, and more about bringing perspective on his evolution as a human. Hopefully some trepidation has been eased and curiosity has been sparked. The molding of the future of opera comes from our willingness to experience these new works, appreciate them for their aims, and talk critically about production as a whole. *X: The Life and Times of Malcolm X* will be in cinemas on November 29th.

The Met has announced its season for Live in HD transmissions.

The dates for these are as listed in This Month and below.

Essays on the opera appear in Viva Voce in appropriate months.

November 18

X: The Life and Times of Malcolm X

Anthony Davis's groundbreaking and influential opera, which premiered in 1986. Tonynominated director Robert O'Hara oversees a potent new staging that imagines Malcolm as an Everyman whose story transcends time and space. Baritone Will Liverman, who triumphed in the Met premiere of *Fire Shut Up in My Bones*, sings Malcolm X, alongside soprano Leah Hawkins as his mother, Louise; mezzo-soprano Raehann Bryce-Davis as his sister Ella; bassbaritone Michael Sumuel as his brother Reginald; and tenor Victor Ryan Robertson as Nation of Islam leader Elijah Muhammad. Kazem Abdullah conducts the newly revised score, which provides a layered, jazz-inflected setting for the esteemed writer Thulani Davis's libretto.

December 9

Florencia en el Amazonas

Sung in Spanish and inspired by the magical realism of Gabriel García Márquez, Mexican composer Daniel Catán's 1996 opera tells the enchanting story of a Brazilian opera diva who returns to her homeland to perform at the legendary opera house of Manaus—and to search for her lost lover, who has vanished into the jungle. The December 9 performance stars soprano Ailyn Pérez as Florencia Grimaldi, with Music Director Yannick Nézet-Séguin on the podium to lead a spellbinding new production by Mary Zimmerman.

January 6

Nabucco

Ancient Babylon comes to life in a classic Met staging of biblical proportions. Baritone George Gagnidze makes his Met role debut as the imperious king Nabucco, alongside soprano Liudmyla Monastyrska reprising her thrilling turn as his vengeful daughter Abigaille. Mezzosoprano Maria Barakova and tenor SeokJong Baek are Fenena and Ismaele, whose love transcends politics, and bass Dmitry Belosselskiy repeats his celebrated portrayal of the high priest Zaccaria. Daniele Callegari conducts Verdi's exhilarating early masterpiece, which features the ultimate showcase for the great Met Chorus, the moving "Va, pensiero."

January 27

Carmen

Acclaimed English director Carrie Cracknell brings a vital new production of one of opera's most enduring and powerful works, the classic story moving the action to the modern day and finding issues that could not be more relevant today: gendered violence, abusive labor structures, and the desire to break through societal boundaries. Dazzling young mezzosoprano Aigul Akhmetshina is Carmen, , alongside tenor Piotr Beczała as Carmen's troubled lover Don José, soprano Angel Blue as the loyal Micaëla, and bass-baritone Kyle Ketelsen as the swaggering Escamillo. Daniele Rustioni conducts Bizet's heart-pounding score.

March 9

La Forza del Destino

Music Director Yannick Nézet-Séguin conducts Verdi's grand tale of ill-fated love, deadly vendettas, and family strife, with stellar soprano Lise Davidsen as the noble Leonora, one of the repertory's most tormented—and thrilling—heroines. Director Mariusz Treliński sets the scene in a contemporary world; the distinguished cast also features tenor Brian Jagde as Leonora's forbidden beloved, Don Alvaro and baritone Igor Golovatenko as her vengeful brother.

March 23

Romeo et Juliette

Radiant soprano Nadine Sierra and tenor sensation Benjamin Bernheim come together as the star-crossed lovers in Gounod's sumptuous Shakespeare adaptation, with Met Music Director Yannick Nézet-Séguin on the podium to conduct one of the repertoire's most romantic scores. Bartlett Sher's towering staging also features baritone Will Liverman and tenor Frederick Ballentine as the archrivals Mercutio and Tybalt, mezzo-soprano Samantha Hankey as the mischievous pageboy Stéphano, and bass-baritone Alfred Walker as Frère Laurent.

April 20

La Rondine

In Puccini;s bittersweet love story, soprano Angel Blue stars as the French courtesan Magda, opposite tenor Jonathan Tetelman as Ruggero, an idealistic young man who offers her an alternative to her life of excess. Maestro Speranza Scappucci conducts Nicolas Joël's Art Deco—inspired staging, which transports audiences from the heart of Parisian nightlife to a dreamy vision of the French Riviera.

May 11

Madama Butterfly

Extraordinary soprano Asmik Grigorian tackles the demanding role of Cio-Cio-San, the loyal geisha at the heart of Puccini's devastating tragedy. Tenor Jonathan Tetelman stars as the callous American naval officer Pinkerton, whose betrayal destroys her. Mezzo-soprano Elizabeth DeShong reprises the role of the steadfast maid Suzuki, and baritone Lucas Meachem is the American consul Sharpless. Acclaimed maestro Xian Zhang takes the podium to conduct Anthony Minghella's vivid production.



When a forest gamekeeper traps a fox and attempts to domesticate her, their encounter leads to a poignant reflection on the natural cycle of life and death, as well as our relationship with the planet. This family-friendly opera invites audiences to reflect on the advancing toll of climate change and the importance of cultivating a harmonious interrelationship with the natural world.

Mozart's dark, twisted masterpiece is presented as you've never seen it before in this breathtaking production from Danish director Kaspar Holten. The show features spectacular set designs combined with ingenious video projections, plunging audiences into an Escherlike web of rotating rooms, revolving with the rhythms of *Don Giovanni*'s infernal drama.





The aging Pasquale refuses to let his love-struck nephew Ernesto marry, and decides to get married himself. The only snag is that the woman he's chosen as his bride-to-be, the fiery Norina, is secretly his nephew's beloved, which sets up a riotous clash between generations.

Never before seen on the COC stage and seldom performed anywhere in the world, *Medea* is an exquisite rarity, featuring one of the most challenging roles in opera history.

As the culmination of our season, world-renowned soprano Sondra Radvanovsky will tackle the role, reuniting with director Sir David McVicar for this brand-new production.


